A t Catholic parishes across the state, country, and world, there are good and holy men leading people to Christ as priests. They offer their lives to Jesus and pray for all of us, their parishioners. But how often are we all, as parishioners, praying for our priests? They urgently need our prayers, as well.

Judy Detloff recognizes that without priests, we'd be without the sacraments. Back in 2020, the Seven Sisters anchoress, or group leader, from another parish called Judy and asked her to be the anchoress for a group here at Parishes on the Prairie to keep the prayers going for Fr. Jeremy Theis. The structure of each group is seven women and one priest for one hour of prayer each day for one year. Ideally, the prayers should happen in front of the Blessed Sacrament.

"It was the Holy Spirit's plan because I had thought about it after a women's retreat, but I procrastinated, so I said 'yes," Judy says. *continued on page 5*

Offering Young Parishioners Valuable



The upcoming Youth Masses will take place:

Sunday, May 19 — 10:30 a.m., St. Paul's in Sauk Centre A fter a group of high school youth returned home from various Catholic conferences, they wanted to be involved in the Mass as a way of living out their faith.

"At a Bible study at the Saltmarshes' home in 2023, the youth asked if they could call Fr. Greg to see if they could lead a youth Mass and sing songs from their retreats," says Shari Saltmarsh. "He happily approved it for all six parishes."

Now, youth from kindergarten through 12th grade are involved in the monthly Youth Mass that rotates among the six parishes in our Area Catholic Community. The youth take on the music, bringing up the gifts, greeting, leading the Rosary before Mass, altar serving, lectoring, ushering, and serving as Extraordinary Ministers for Holy Communion. There are between 15 and 20 youth typically involved during a given Mass.

Shari facilitates with each parish faith formation leader and the music director to coordinate the Youth Mass. The Masses occur on the third weekend of each month. As she notes, it's important to involve youth in this way for "building up and empowering the future church" as servant hearts of Jesus through Mary.

Through their involvement and service, the youth are engaging in a means of stewardship for our parish community. They are sharing their time and talents with our congregation, and offering it back to God.

"It energizes them and gives them a sense of belonging as participating in the Mass in various roles," Shari says.

Since the Masses began, Shari says some of the youth have joined liturgical ministries in their respective parishes, serving as lectors or distributing Holy Communion as

Extraordinary Ministers. There have been a number of positive impacts on the congregations, as well as the youth themselves. Shari says that parishioners have offered positive feedback, encouraging our youth in their walk as the future of the Church.

"The youth have been getting to know other parishes and their parishioners," Shari says. "They are growing closer to Christ by serving Him in the Mass and taking their servant hearts into the world outside of church. They feel they are a part of something, like they are made for more and they belong to something more than just this side of heaven." Any youth are welcome to sign up to serve for a Youth Mass at any parish.

"The youth and their families know they are welcome to participate in any ministry upon entering any of our six parishes," Shari says. "Praise God for this unity.

"I circle them up and pray with the youth before and after each Youth Mass," she adds. "We lift up our intentions of praise and thanksgiving for our ACC's progress of growing in friendship and holiness with youth from near and far. Any youth are always welcome at any parish, without question or doubt — just like Jesus welcomed everyone."

Fr. Theis was moving here on July 6, 2020, and Judy had one week to find six other women so they could begin on his first day. So, a group was formed.

"I introduced myself to Fr. Theis and told him I was his new Anchoress," Judy says. "He knew that if he needed special prayers he would contact me, and I would relay the request to the other women."

The Seven Sisters Apostolate was started in 2010 by Janette Howe, who felt a calling to pray specifically for the Rector of the Cathedral of St. Paul in St. Paul, Minn., Fr. Joseph R. Johnson. She was so appreciative of all he did for her and her family. In 2011, Janette was praying a holy hour for Fr. Joseph, and she heard the words "Seven Sisters." She felt a calling to invite six other women to pray for one hour per day, specifically for their pastor and for a

deepening of his devotion to the Blessed Mother.

Being part of this apostolate has deepened Judy's faith. She believes this is a very important ministry because our priests truly need our prayers.

"The Seven Sisters Apostolate is a call to strengthen the Church by ensuring that a holy hour is prayed each day of the week for the sole intention of a specific priest or bishop," Judy says.

When Fr. Theis was reassigned, a few of the women stayed on to pray for Fr. Joe Korf, a retired priest. Judy also prays on Thursdays with another group. Fr. Greg Paffel and Fr. Mark Botzet have their own Seven Sisters groups.

The hour is meant to focus only on the priest and his intentions. The group also prays that he would have a deepening devotion to Mary.

THE *Clerciful Jesus* COMMITTEE:

Devoted to Spreading the Message of Divine Mercy

Promulgated by St. Faustina, the good news of Christ's divine mercy and the recitation of the Divine Mercy Chaplet has become a powerful devotion within the Catholic Church. Putting this good news at the forefront, the mission of the Merciful Jesus Committee is to spread the message of Christ's divine mercy.

Committee member Mark Haskamp has been struck by the powerful message of divine mercy on a personal level and wants to share it with others.

"The mission is quite simply to promote the message of divine mercy," Mark says. "That message is that God loves us and He wants us to recognize that His mercy is greater than our sins."

In the 1930s, St. Faustina wrote a diary that chronicled her mystical visions of Jesus. Our Lord would appear to her often in prayer and instruct her to pray for the world. He taught her the evils and ugly consequences of sin and provided her with mystical insights into the moral state of the world. The most powerful mandate Christ shared with St. Faustina was for her to remind the world of His mercy and how His grace conquers sin.

The Merciful Jesus Committee was started in 1979 when four men were inspired by St. Faustina's diary. They were so convicted by Jesus' divine mercy that they built a shrine and carved an image of the Merciful Jesus.

"In the early years of the ministry, the carving was a shrine," Mark says. "It was brought to many communities and homes of people who were ill, or in need of conversion."

The founders of the committee were zealous in their pursuit of sharing Christ's message of mercy and redemption.

"The men sent information about the devotion to congressional representatives, congress, and national leaders, including, at the time, President Ronald Reagan," Mark says.

The men also spent time sharing the message of Christ's

divine mercy throughout the diocese. As they started to see the fruits of their labor within our diocese, they decided that the carving of the Merciful Jesus should be enshrined at St. Paul's Church so that more people could come and visit it.

Now the Merciful Jesus Committee continues this mission by hosting activities and events. "Our biggest event of the year is Divine Mercy Sunday, which will be held on April 7 this year," Mark says. "We are planning to host Eucharistic Adoration and Confessions before the 4 p.m. Mass." Adoration will start at 3 p.m. as this is the hour of mercy, the time that Jesus died on the cross. During adoration, the Divine Mercy Chaplet will be said.

One of the greatest gifts of St. Faustina's visions with Christ was the institution of the Divine Mercy Chaplet. It is a prayer said on the rosary, where two major prayers are repeated in a meditative way. In addition to spreading the message of God's mercy, the Merciful Jesus Committee works towards raising awareness of this prayer.

"In the chaplet, the prayers revolve around mercy and



holiness for the whole world," Mark says. "It's an extremely powerful prayer for our souls and for the sanctification of the world. Also, Christ promised that whoever recites the chaplet will receive great mercy at the hour of their death."

All are encouraged to visit the shrine and pray the Divine Mercy Chaplet.
